The UW LEAH Program is a federally funded interdisciplinary training program that prepares the next generation of leaders to improve adolescent health systems, reduce health disparities, and develop youth-centered, family-involved, culturally responsive care.

Training & Curriculum

The UW LEAH Fellowship provides mentored, interdisciplinary training for graduate students and post-graduate trainees. From September 2026 through June 2027, fellows dedicate approximately 8 hours per week to developing expertise in:

- Adolescent health and development
- Interdisciplinary teamwork and leadership
- Research and evidence-based practice
- Public health policy and advocacy
- Community engagement and family-centered care
- Program development and quality improvement
